## An Introduction to the District Explorer Scout Young Leaders' Award Scheme

### District Explorer Scout Young Leaders' Scheme- An Overview



DEYL's are Explorer Scouts who volunteer alongside adult leaders in a Squirrel Drey, Beaver Colony, Cub Pack or Scout Troop. A valuable asset to any leadership team, DEYL's play an active role in the section, bringing a range of fresh ideas to the table, and acting as positive role models for the young people they work alongside.

Although the Scheme is usually taken on by Explorer Scouts looking for a new challenge, young people from outside Scouting can also participate if they are working towards their Duke of Edinburgh's Awards or Queen's Guide Award. They can do this by volunteering as non-members for a set period of time i.e. for three to six months if completing their Duke of Edinburgh's Award (Bronze).

The DEYL's' Scheme is the training programme for all Young Leaders. It contains 11 modules and four missions for them to work through whilst volunteering in their chosen section. Modules give young leaders the skills and knowledge to be successful in their role, while missions allow them to put everything into practice with support. As well as developing valuable life skills, the Scheme is an opportunity for young leaders to make a positive impact in their communities and to fulfil the service elements of many of the top awards in Scouting. Recognition of achievement is available along the way, and on completion of the Scheme, the ESYL is awarded with an ESYL belt buckle.



Scouts can request to return to their old Scout Troop to volunteer as an ESYL. However, it is highly recommended that they have a break of 12 months before doing this. This extra time allows them to develop their skills and gives the old Troop extra time to accept and adjust to the fact they are now an explorer young leader with different responsibilities. Having a reasonable gap will mean that you won't just be seen as another Senior Patrol Leader when you return and are supporting their peers.

#### **As an Explorer Young Leader I will....**

- Act as a positive role model to the Squirrels/Beavers/Cubs/Scouts that I am working with.
- Carry my Young People First (Orange Card) and follow the safeguarding standards at all times
- Take an active role in supporting the section leaders during the whole meeting
- Contact at least one of the leaders if I am unable to make a meeting, giving as much notice as possible
- Assist in setting up and clearing up the session alongside other leaders

## The Purpose of Scouting

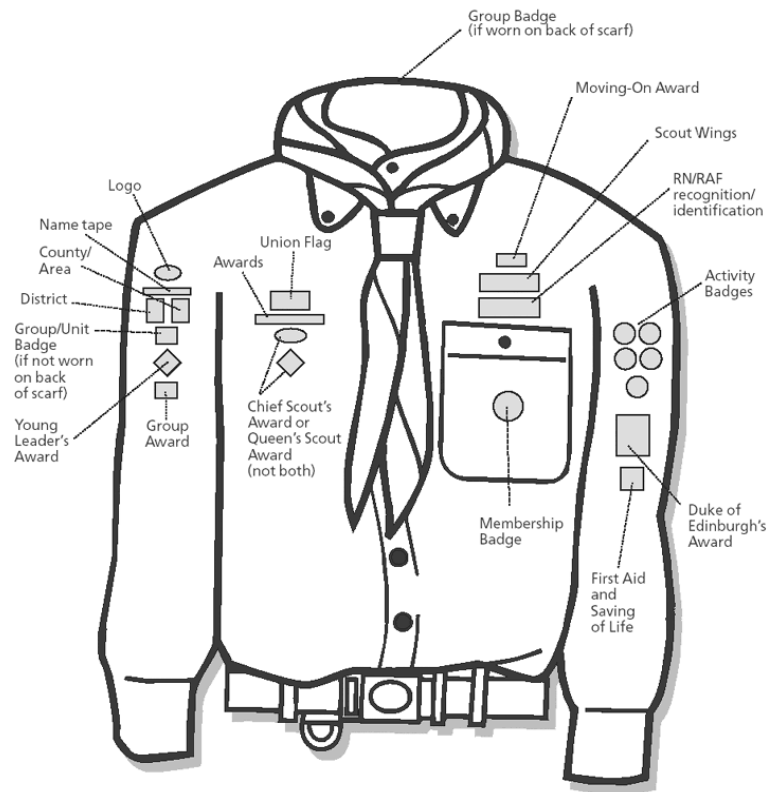


'To help young people achieve their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potential as individuals, as responsible citizens and as Members of their local, national and international communities'.
